


As a reminder, there is no school tomorrow, Friday, November 1 and no school next week on Monday, November 4. Teachers will be working on completing

Happy Halloween! We finished up our Halloween theme this week with some fun activities and crafts. We exercised our fine motor skills in a few different ways this week. We used ink pads and cotton swabs to dot paint bats. This requires strength and control to press the cotton swab onto the pad and then unto the paper to create small circles. We also pinched and pulled apart cotton balls and glued the pieces down to a paper cutout of a ghost to add to our decorations in the hallway. Introduced this week was scissor skills. We used child safety scissors to practice holding the scissors properly and also the opening and closing motion to be able to cut paper. Play dough was also a big hit this week and was played with in the morning during free play almost every day. All of these activities are helpful to build up our prewriting muscles and skills.



We were able to play outside and enjoy some warm days this week. We did play in the gym for the first time this week to avoid rain and the strong winds. It was fun to have a change of scenery for our morning playtime.

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#### From Ms. Pam Holm

Falling leaves and a chill in the air means it's the perfect time to study pumpkins! The Saplings Dramatic Play area transformed into a Pumpkin Patch, promoting reading, writing and math activities. Multiple pumpkins where available for counting purposes and various seed manipulatives for one-to-one counting correlation.

The pumpkin hammer was significant success, refining hand-eye coordination, arm and hand strength, and fine motor skills. Rubber bands were added to the activity – a 3D pumpkin geoboard. They loved working their fine



motor muscles some more as they decided where they could stretch the rubber bands. They made triangles, lines, squares... more learning!

This week, circle time featured multiple pumpkin-inspired songs. Pumpkin Bells stood out as a favorite, with the Saplings eagerly shaking their bells. Singing or listening to music releases endorphins and generates brain activity, hence most children are responsive to music as it inspires positive, emotional regulation.

Our science and sensory play involved carving out a pumpkin. The Saplings began by doing a pumpkin investigation. They examined the outside of a pumpkin using their five senses and recorded their observations. Then, we cut open a pumpkin and look closely at the inside. They again used their five senses to observe the pumpkin. During this investigation they learned that a pumpkin is a fruit because it grows from a flower and has seeds on the inside. Upon completing our data collection, we develop the pumpkin display's parts and continue with learning about the pumpkin's life cycle.

On Thursday we focused on pumpkin fun! This day was for tasting pumpkin treats. We made pumpkin muffins and toasted pumpkin seeds, as well as playing pumpkin games and making pumpkin crafts. The day ended with a **Pumpkin-Cano**! The erupting pumpkin was an excellent example of chemical reaction.

Don't forget to fall back an hour this Sunday.

2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> Grade Elementary Teacher

Halloween week and the last week of the quarter has been full of fun and excitement! We also finished studying the European continent as well and will be moving onto South America in November! We spent time learning about the purpose of the government and additional services that it provides. We ended the unit by making a service poster. This week we did art inspired by Gustav Klimt and made his Tree of Life. Lastly, we ended our week with a little Halloween celebration and a trick or treating adventure to the Tofte Forest Service.

English has been increasingly more exciting as students find their groove with participation. It is evident of how hard the students are working to build understanding around literature. We learned about homophones and synonyms this week and practiced sorting by syllables. Each week, we continue to build our vocabulary base and spelling by doing semantic mapping and vocab task cards. Each student has been decoding unfamiliar words more consistently than the beginning of the year and that has helped increase fluency.

This week in math, third grade focused on math puzzles and writing the first question to two step word problems. This has been challenging for all students but really good for problem solving skills. Second graders worked through double addition with their preferred style. This has been the first week where we spent the whole time working with regrouping. It is a much appreciated challenge for all.

This week has been chilly! We are requiring students to wear jackets outside (at least) so please send the works with your child (hats, mittens, boots, and coats.) This will help with sicknesses and keep everyone comfortable! Also, we have conferences next week. Be on the lookout for your virtual link (if that's how you signed up) otherwise I will see you next week in person! If you didn't sign up, I will have slots open until Friday of this week, then I will close the signups down. Reach out with any questions!


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# From Ms. Stacy Coronis

4<sup>th</sup> & 5<sup>th</sup> Grade Elementary Teacher

We have been hard at work in our classroom this week! In addition to Halloween activities, we have spent a lot of time on our Pirate Island Projects. Everyone has created a unique island with 10 landforms, a compass rose and a key for the landforms and the scale. Soon we will celebrate our learning with a "Pirate Day" in our classroom.

In reading the 4th graders have practiced making inferences based on context clues and the 5th graders have worked to identify the sequence used in nonfiction writing to comprehend the order of events in a story. All students are wrapping up a math unit and will take the unit test next Thursday and Friday. 4th graders will show what they know about place value, comparing and ordering large numbers, adding and subtracting large numbers, and estimating sums and differences by rounding. 5th graders will be assessed on drawing, comparing and simplifying fractions. They are also expected to be able to add and subtract fractions and mixed numbers with uncommon denominators. Everyone has done their best each day and I

Conferences will be held in person or online so please indicate your preference when you sign up. I can't wait to share the successes from the first two months of school.
